There is no doubt that trained leaders deliver a better program for a unit's youth and trained leaders find their job easier, too! The following requirements are those needed to be considered "trained":

Cub Scouts

Cub Scout Specifics (online)

Boy Scouts

Youth Protection (online) Scout Leader Specifics Outdoor Leader Skills

Additional training is available for those leaders who have completed these core courses.

Adult Scout Training- NEEDED BY ALL ADULT SCOUTERS

<u>Youth Protection</u> – The importance of completing this training course cannot be overemphasized. All registered Scouters need to know the information it coveys about child abuse and the barriers Scouting puts into place to ensure such incidents do not occur within the program.

Duration: One (1) hour. This is available on-line; go to illowabsa.org and follow the links.

Cub Scout Leader Training

<u>Cub Scout Leader Specifics</u> – "Specifics" takes up where "Essentials" leaves off in program content for Cub Leaders. You'll learn all about how Packs, Dens, and Cub leader positions operate, how to plan and run Cub Scout programs, the Webelos program, awards and ceremonies, uniforms, rank and advancements, the "how-to's" and the "do's and don'ts" of Cub Scouting. Duration: Ninety (90) min.

<u>Cub Scout POW WOW</u> – is Scout training for all adult leaders, committee members, and parents in Cub Scouting. Participants get to choose their own classes from a wide selection including: Cub Scout Leader Specifics, Games, Crafts, Advancement Ceremonies, Den and Pack Programs, tips for leaders, Songs, Transitions, Webelos Activities, Cooking, and more!

<u>BALOO/OWL-</u> The BALOO (Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation) include the why and how of Cub Scout camping – planning, equipment, meal preparation, and campfire programs. The OWL (Outdoor Leader Skills for Webelos Leaders) training will teach the differences between family camping and Webleos Den overnight camping. You will learn advanced camping skills to help teach your Webelos how to have a fun and safe Boy Scout-like campout.



Boy Scout Leader Training

Boy Scout Leader Specific Training – Boy Scout Specifics deals with the "indoor" aspects of overseeing the many elements of a Scout Troop. It will cover Awards, and Ceremonies, Advancement, Troop record keeping, Program planning, Youth leadership and training and much more. This course is appropriate for any adult working in the Boy Scout program, and is taught at the Council level.

<u>OLS- Outdoor Leader Skills</u> – Because so much of the Boy Scout program is associated with the outdoors, Boy Scout leaders must also complete this course to be officially "Trained." OLS will teach all the outdoor elements: fire, food and shelter, as well as wood, tools, knots, first aid and much more. This course is particularly important for Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters, and is taught at the Council level.

Training Opportunities for Boy Scout Youth Members

<u>Den Chief Training</u> – A Den Chief is a Boy Scout who has been selected to help a Cub Scout Den Leader at meetings; setting the example for the Cub Scouts. Den Chief training is offered annually at the POW WOW.

<u>NYLT (Junior Leader Training)</u> – National Youth Leadership Training is a premier training course for youth leaders. Using elements of the Scouting method, the NYLT Troop and Patrols learn outdoor skills and leadership techniques in a strong, supportive, and challenging atmosphere. Troops whose youth attend this training will notice an immediate and positive change in Troop dynamics.

Other Leader Training Opportunities

<u>Climbing Instructor Training</u> – Boy Scout leaders wishing to take their Troop climbing or rappelling must first be certified through this course.

<u>COPE Unit Team Training</u> – Looking for a way to train an existing youth team, Patrol Leaders Council, Crew Officers Group, etc. Check out a COPE Team Training Weekend! Two groups of no more than eight youth participants will camp and live the full COPE adventure. Friday evening to Sunday afternoon means an intense experience that will mold your existing leadership group into a real TEAM... more effective, more efficient, more valuable to your unit. This course is taught twice a year at the Council Level.

<u>COPE Facilitator Training</u> – This course leads to a facilitator card to assist with COPE courses under a COPE Director.

<u>College of Commissioner Science</u> - A MUST for Commissioners! You may choose 6 courses from a varied selection and work towards a Bachelor or advanced degree in Commissioner Science. You must have completed Commissioner Basic Training to participate.

<u>Wood Badge</u> – Wood Badge for the 21st Century is designed for all Scout leaders. It is for Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, and Venturing leaders, as well as council and district leaders. Its focus is on leadership, not outdoor skills. The first part of the new Wood Badge course reflects unit meetings, while the second part of the course uses a unit camping activity as it's delivery model.

<u>Cub Scout & Boy Scout Leader Roundtables</u> - Roundtables are held monthly for the purpose of giving adult leaders the skills and ideas they need to deliver an exciting Cub or Boy Scout program to boys. The roundtable serves also to renew each leader's enthusiasm and dedication. The Cub Scout session features ceremonies, games, and activities for den and pack meetings built around the next month's theme. The Boy Scout session emphasizes important aspects of the Boy Scout program and feature a monthly training segment.
